TWAS Prizes

Each year the Academy awards eight prizes of US\$15,000 each to individual scientists who have been working and living in a developing country for at least ten years. The Prizes are given in the following eight fields of science: agricultural sciences, biology, chemistry, earth sciences, engineering sciences, mathematics, medical sciences and physics. Deadline: 31 March.





• The TWAS-AAS-Microsoft Award for Young Scientists

The Prize will recognize young scientists in Africa whose research in computer science promises to have a positive impact in the developing world. Each year, three winners will be selected from different countries on the continent. Each recipient will receive a Euro 7,000 cash award generously contributed by Microsoft. Deadline: 15 May.

TWAS Prizes to Young Scientists in Developing Countries

The Academy invites national science academies, scientific research councils, ministries of science and technology and high-level research organizations in the South to institute a scheme of TWAS prizes for young scientists in their countries. **Important: The programme is directed at organizations, not individual scientists.** Deadline: none.

• TWAS Medal Lectures

Every year, the Academy honours three TWAS Members for their achievements in their fields of research. The recipients lecture on a main aspect of their work, and are presented with a plague.

• Abdus Salam Medal for Science and Technology

The medal was instituted to honour the Academy's founder and first president, Professor Abdus Salam. It is awarded to highly distinguished personalities who





have served the cause of science in the Third World.

• C.N.R. Rao Prize for Scientific Research

The prize, named after TWAS Founding Fellow and former president, CNR Rao, carries a cash award of US\$5,000 and is usually presented every three years. It is designed to honour distinguished scientists from the developing world, especially scientists from the world's scientifically and technologically lagging countries, who have made significant contributions to global science.

• TWAS Research Grants Programme in Basic Sciences

The 'TWAS Research Grants' and 'TWAS Research Units in Least Developed Countries' have been amalgamated. Under this new scheme, grants are awarded to high-level promising research projects in biology, chemistry, mathematics and physics carried out by either individual scientists or research units in the 80 S&T-lagging countries (S&TLCs) identified by TWAS. Deadline: 31 August.

ICGEB-TWAS-UNESCO/IBSP Joint Project on Capacity Building in Basic Molecular Biology

Together with ICGEB and UNESCO/IBSP, TWAS has launched a new funding opportunity through the implementation





of the "Joint Project on Capacity Building in Basic Molecular Biology" that aims at creating a network of laboratories involved in research on plant and animal pathogens affecting agricultural productivity in developing regions. Deadline for Phase 1: 31 March 2009.

This fellowship is open to all women citizens and permanent residents from Sub-Saharan African countries.

Academic staff of ANSTI member institutions can also benefit from conference grants (a maximum amount of award being \$2,500) to attend international meetings where they will present papers.

ARPPIS was established in 1983 as a partnership programme with African Universities (now 34) and *icipe*, to provide young African scientists with the opportunity to study and learn in Africa, the insect pests and vectors that are a threat to the health and sustenance of the African people and which limit the continent's development.

 Postgraduate Research Fellowships at the PhD level. The three-year icipebased doctoral fellowship scheme enrolls an average of six research students annually, and releases an average of three PhD graduates to the national





research and educational systems every year. These new graduates continue to expand the pool of ARPPIS-trained arthropod scientists and help in promoting intra-regional cooperation among research organisations and universities throughout Africa.

Best Student Scientific Prize of icipe. icipe has a policy of encouraging all scholars undertaking training to publish their research findings in peer-reviewed journals. In general, it is expected that scholars attached to the centre pursuing research studies at MSc and PhD level to publish at least one and three peer reviewed papers, respectively, during their training period. In an effort to recognise scholarly achievements within the icipe-sponsored postgraduate training programmes, the icipe Governing Council initiated an annual prize competition in 2003. Cash prizes and a certificate of recognition are awarded to the winners.

In 1996, the African Wildlife Foundation introduced the Charlotte Conservation Fellows program to provide support for African nationals pursuing Masters degrees or doctoral research. Charlotte Fellowships enable recipients to improve their qualifications, update their skills, acquire the latest information on natural resource management and adapt new technologies to their work.

Each year, AWF supports three to six Charlotte





		Fellows. While expenses and materials vary according to recipient, scholarships are awarded for amounts up to \$25,000. Since its inception, the program has helped 50 students from East, West, central, and southern Africa pursue graduate degrees in fields ranging from biology and conservation economics to enterprise development and community conservation.

- SRF fund: Applications of all nationalities are welcome, and need not be members of either the Systematics Association or the Linnean Society of London. Typical activities supported include contributions to fieldwork expenditure, the purchase of scientific equipment or expertise (e.g. buying time on analytical equipment), specimen preparation (including the cost of temporary technical assistance), and contributions to publication costs. Projects of a more general or educational nature will also be considered, provided that they include a strong systematics component. Typical activities not supported include attendance at scientific meetings and contributions to student maintenance or tuition fees. The fund does not provide payments for Bench Fees. Projects already substantially funded by other bodies may be disadvantaged.
- The Systematics and Taxonomy (SynTax) research scheme is designed to provide short-term funding for preliminary research that will form the basis of novel





responsive mode proposals with a substantial systematics/taxonomy component. The scheme is supported by BBSRC and NERC research councils with additional funding available from DEFRA for UK BAP priority species and the scheme aims to stimulate high quality taxonomy and systematics-related research proposals to the UK's Research Councils. The scheme follows on from the Collaborative Systematics (CoSyst) scheme, through which a number of projects have gone on to receive responsive mode funding.
